The Hero's Journey Chart for The Hobbit Wordly Wise Vocabulary Level 7: Lessons 6-11

Timed Write:

Explore the stages of The Hero's Journey Bilbo has experience thus far and the impact they have had on his development.

Composition: Persuasive/Expository Essay

Using a work in popular culture, such as a film, television or web series, or novel, and show the progression of the hero through The Hero's Journey.

Composition: Critical Analysis

Given his development throughout the book, does Bilbo belong in Hobbiton at the end of the novel? He is not completely accepted by the hobbit community, but he seems to be perfectly happy there. How do you think Tolkien views the relationship between heroism and the simple life?

In many quest stories, the protagonist undertakes a double search. Even as he labors to complete his mission, he seeks some possibility buried deep within himself. Have the class discuss Bilbo's struggle to keep his timid Baggins side from overcoming "the Tookish part." How does the Bilbo of Chapter XIX differ from the hobbit who hosted "An Unexpected Party"? Is our hero's inner quest complete when he enters the Lonely Mountain? (On page 192 we learn, "Already he was a very different hobbit from the one that had run out without a pocket-handkerchief from Bag-End long ago.") Or does he still need to grow in curiosity, courage, or compassion?

- 1. There are many secrets in this story. Discuss the reasons why people need to keep secrets: Nana and Papa, Hattie's parents, Adam, Hattie, Angel how do their secrets affect them and those around them?
- 2. Hattie develops a concern that she might be like Adam. Would her fears be lessened if she didn't keep them to herself? Would she have the same fears if Adam's condition had not been kept a secret from her?
- 3. Why does Adam hate the camera so much? What does the camera represent to him? Why does Martin begin the novel with Hattie looking at home movies of the summer and of the family's past?
- 4. Discuss the concept and meaning of the words "freak" and "freak show." Compare the ways these words are used referring to Adam and to the carnival sideshow.
- 5. Discuss the meaning of the title. Does the phrase "a corner of the universe" mean something different to each of the characters? What does it mean to Hattie, to Adam, to the boarders, to Leila, to Nana?
- 6. What would you identify as the true meaning of friendship after reading this book?

Many of the selections you have read also focus on individuals who must struggle for physical and/or spiritual survival. Choose one of the character you have read about during this term, and write a short essay explaining how the character you choose struggled with overwhelming forces. You may choose to focus solely on the character you select, or you may compare and contrast that character to Peyton Farquhar.

Composition: Critical Analysis Essay

- 1. Dreams: What is the importance of dreams in Of Mice and Men? What role do they play in people's lives? How do people use dreams, and how do various characters' dreams affect them?
- 2. Discrimination: Look at the various examples of discrimination in Of Mice and Men. How does discrimination affect different characters? How do characters respond to discrimination, and how does it affect their lives, and the outcome of the story?
- 3. Friendship. How does Steinbeck portray friendship in Of Mice and Men? How does its presence or absence affect different characters, in their actions and in their relationships? What does it require of people, and what does it offer them in return?

 4. Longlings, Many of the characters in Of Mice and Mon seem longly. Why are various characters longly, and how does it.
- 4. Loneliness. Many of the characters in Of Mice and Men seem lonely. Why are various characters lonely, and how does it affect them?5. Power. Think about different characters in Of Mice and Men, and the power that they have. What different kinds of power do
- different characters have? Where does it come from? What do they do with it? How does it help them, or hurt them?

 6. Foreshadowing. Consider the many examples of foreshadowing in Of Mice and Men. What important actions and plot points are foreshadowed? How do these important events differ from the events that foreshadow them? How does foreshadowing help us understand the important turning points in the novella?
